FATHER JOHN'S REFLECTION



Advent was about waiting and preparing. For the little ones, time passed SOO slowly, but for adults, we were rushed to get everything done, weren't we? And now we're in the new year. What lies ahead?

January takes its name from the Roman god named Janus. He is usually represented as having two faces, one looking forward and one looking back. He is the god of beginnings and transitions, and thereby of gates, doors, doorways, passages, and endings – things that you pass through. As we enter the new year, it is natural that we remember the past year's joys and sorrows and look forward with hope to what the new year will bring.

For some moments in time, we have fixed markers. Valentine's Day, Memorial Day, the Fourth of July, Labor Day, Halloween, and Thanksgiving. In our personal lives, birthdays and anniversaries are also predictable – and highly memorable! The dates are the same every year.

The Church, however, has its own unique way of keeping time. In the fourth century, we decided that Christmas would always fall on December 25, and we agreed on how to schedule Easter. Our calendar has both fixed and movable feast days. This month we celebrate both the Christmas season (all twelve days) and the beginning of the Epiphany season, which can vary in length depending on when Easter falls.

We will celebrate Epiphany at our service on January 7, and you will notice that our creche will now be com-

plete: the magi and their camel will signal Christ's revelation to the Gentiles even while Jesus is only a baby. The parish thanks Bob Welham for his generous gift. The season of Epiphany will end on Ash Wednesday, which ironically falls on Valentine's Day. If this irony is not enough, Easter falls on April 1. I don't even want to think about all the comments that this will stimulate.

Many people use the prospect of the new year to make personal resolutions. I don't know if you're good at keeping yours, but researchers have found that only about 8% achieve their goals for more than a few days. The challenge for the Church is to be faithful to our collective resolutions – we call this living into our baptismal covenants, a theme that will be prominently stressed in the new ministry service on January 16.

On December 19 the people of St. Mark's invited nearly 80 people to share a delicious meal of lasagna, salad, bread, and Christmas cookies with punch. Before the meal, many people gathered in the church to sing Christmas carols. This meal is in the truest spirit of Christmas.

In December Mother Hubbard's Cupboard served 99 families. This includes 293 individuals, 7 first-time families, and 20 first-time individuals (adults and children). For 2017, we served 3,515 people (1,282 families). 94 families and 277 individuals visited MHC for the first time. Since the population of Lewistown and surrounding towns in the 2010 census was 11,447, we touched almost 30% of the people in this town. Poverty is real, and it's in our community.

SERVICE FOR NEW MINISTRY AND RECTOR (AS PRINTED IN LEWISTOWN SENTINEL)

The Wardens, Vestry, and Parishioners of St. Mark's Episcopal Church announce with great pleasure, the Celebration Service of the New Ministry and Institution of John T. Harwood as Rector of St. Mark's Episcopal Church, by The Right Reverend Audrey Scanlan, Bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Central Pennsylvania. The service will take place on **Tuesday**, **January 16**, **7:00 PM**, with a reception to follow.

Father Harwood came to St. Mark's on Pentecost, 2017, after spending seven years serving Trinity Episcopal Church and Zion's Evangelical Lutheran Church in Renovo, Pennsylvania. He was ordained to the diaconate in 2010 and priesthood in 2011 by Bishop Nathan Baxter. He received his certificate in Anglican Studies in 2013 from the California Divinity School of the Pacific. He completed his training in pastoral care at the Geisinger Medical Center in Danville, and his parish internship was at St. Luke's-Altoona. Within the Diocese of Central Pennsylvania he has served on the Board for the School of Christian Studies (now the Stevenson School), the Standing Committee, and the Clergy Discipline Committee. He retired from Penn State in 2016 after a long career as a faculty member and administrator. He is the author of three

books and many articles and has a forthcoming volume, *John Evelyn: Dramatist*, in preparation for the Penn State University Press. His most recent article on the theology of Sallie McFague, a contemporary American theologian, can be downloaded from the *Anglican Theological Review*. Much of her work has investigated how metaphors reflect and shape meaning in Scripture and theology.

Fr. Harwood joins St. Mark's Episcopal Church as we serve as the Body of Christ in Lewistown and beyond. His leadership will help us continue to deepen our faith, fulfill our mission, and serve a world in need. We hope you will join us on **January 16**, **7:00 PM** as we celebrate this new phase of our life together at St. Mark's.
