FATHER JOHN'S REFLECTION



Traditionally in Europe, a well fattened goose, fed on the stubble from the fields after the harvest, was eaten to protect against financial need in the family for the next year. There is an old English saying that captures this spirit: "Eat a goose on Michaelmas Day / Want not for money all the year." Many people believe that eating goose on Michelmas (September 29 is the Feast or Mass of St. Michael and All Angels) brought good luck for the year – we have similar beliefs about eating pork on New Year's Day.

So what's the connection to goose? Renters would pay their landlords a year's rent in advance, and a goose would be provided as a "bonus." Goose Day was the time for "hiring fairs" – if you were a peasant and wanted to seek a better job, this was the time to do it. With a festive goose dinner (as I enjoyed at Michele's), spirits were raised.

We remember Michael as being the greatest of the Archangels – he defeated Satan in the war in Heaven (see Rev. 12:7-12). If you remember Milton's *Paradise Lost*, he was then exiled to Hell but along the way, one story goes, he landed on earth right on top of a prickly blackberry bush. Thus, September 29 became the last day when blackberries were available for harvest in England. On the brighter side, Michael is our protector in times of darkness, physical and spiritual.



Even more important than eating goose, St. Michael's Day marks the change of seasons. We are now in autumn; it is harvest time. This is an annual cycle, a rhythm of life. Last Sunday we had the rare opportunity to baptize two infants into their lives in Christ. Raelynn Hevner came all the way from Renovo with her grandmother, great-grandmother, parents, and siblings. With more than 60 persons in the church, we all had the chance to renew our baptismal vows and commitment to follow Christ.

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THE MINISTRY OF MOTHER HUBBARD'S **CUPBOARD: FEED MY SHEEP**

September was Hunger Action Month! As a congregation, we are joining the fight against hunger. With more than 40 percent of households living below the poverty level in the United States, many children are affected by hunger. In our own communities in Pennsylvania, one in six children are struggling with hunger. Recently, one child in our area, while receiving food from a summer recreation program, told a staff member, "I am so glad you are here. I haven't eaten since vesterday." Remember that for many children, the breakfast and lunch at school are their best meals of the day.

In September we served 258 people: 88 families, including 5 first-time families as well as 11 firsttime individuals.

- Public space in a notable and historic location within the borough.



HISTORICAL IMAGES OF ST. MARK'S



Where in the world is this church? We'll, it's St. Mark's sometime between 1867 and 1895. Forty years after building a brick church, the vestry decided to make the church a bit more like the other churches in Lewistown. For instance, they added a steeple and a stone façade. But you'll see the same doors and windows

as in the original church. In the 1880s, this church was torn down; some of the bricks were re-used in the parish house, and this image became a distant memory.

The history is complicated. The brick church was built in the 1820s, got a façade in 1867, and was demolished in the 1880s. The "parish house" was built to look like a chapel and served as one while the new church was being

A few years after that the rectory was built. If you look closely, you can see the stone masons hard at work. What you don't see are the modern construction tools like cranes.

The next time you look at our church office and rectory, give thanks for the skills of these Lewistown workers. Imagine the challenge of "stitching" together three buildings and making all of the systems – electrical and plumbing - work so well.



Imagine the courage and commitment of the parishioners who wanted their buildings better reflect who they were and what their mission was in this community. Through good times and bad, we have been strengthened by the lives and witness of those who went before.

FUNERAL PLANNING GUIDE

As Woody Allen says, nobody gets out of here alive. St. Mark's had three funerals within four weeks (Peg, Carey Ann, and Sara – may they rest in peace), and in every case, families are greatly stressed when they have to make funeral arrangements for a loved one.

Fr. Harwood has a "Funeral Planning Guide" which is a great tool to use to let your loved ones know of your wishes for your funeral. Do you have favorite hymns you would like to have sung or played; do you have special scriptures you would like read? In the Book of Common Prayer, page 494, suggested scriptures are listed; but possibly you have scriptures that are very meaningful to you for one reason or another; these scriptures could be used as well. Many times family members are not aware of your wishes and this guide can be a great benefit to them and reduce the stress of making a funeral service a real

reflection of their loved one's life.

Other issues to consider are what you want included in your obituary: those who have gone before and those who are surviving. Even though these may change at the time the information is necessary, it will provide a great re-
