
But what do we know about their lives outside of the markets? How much do they

We will celebrate Pentecost **on June 8.** When the Holy Spirit fell upon the 120 followers of Jesus, they had an intense religious experience, but they didn't have clear marching orders. They had to invent the church; they didn't inherit it. This means that they had to discern how to worship, how to serve their community, and how to pay their bills. And yes, they had to figure out how to keep churches connected: this is why the Episcopal Church today has parishes, dioceses, and provinces as well as deacons, priests, and bishops.

The disciples were sent out from Jerusalem (their comfort zone) to Judea and then to Samaria (their non-comfort zone). What is the Holy Spirit nudging us to reimagine about our parish after Pentecost 2025? How can we move out of our comfort zones to share the Good News?

On a personal note, I begin my ninth year at St. Mark's on Pentecost, 2025, because my first Sunday with you was Pentecost 2017. Is nine years the record? No, your longest-serving

rector was Father William Heakes (1910-24). Father Bill Weitzel (1968-75) and Father Pete Greenfield (1975-83) served seven and eight years respectively. I am so grateful to serve God and the people of St. Mark's. Father John\*
